Manhattan Beach (3,485.31): The City's hauler continued to canvas AB 341 accounts which do not have a recycling program. City is almost 100% compliant. Businesses are approximately 90% compliant, and multifamily dwellings are over 94% compliant. Commercial food waste pilot continues with (25) businesses participating. Manhattan Studios alone generate over (17 tons) of food waste a month, and the other commercial participants combined generated over (300 tons) in 2013. Tonnage includes Village Mall Compactor;
