Beverly Hills -Total commercial recyclables = 3,723.00 tons; Rolloff Box recyclables = 25,656.00 for a total of 29,379 tons. Duarte - 108.84 tons in 2004. Hidden Hills - no programs feasible due to lack of significant commercial sector waste. Los Angeles - variety of programs provided to businesses by private haulers; outreach technical assistance is provided by City. Programs on-going. Lynwood - Franchise haulers recycled 0.72 tons in 2004. Manhattan Beach - Program on-going. No changes. However, we did complete a third party recycling audit in order to estimate the tonnage coming through these programs. Third party recycling is very active. 853.38 tons in 2004. Pomona - Successfully complied with SB 1055 Time Extension requirements. Pomona achieved 52% diversion rate, independent of LARA. Commercial recycling showed significant expansion in 4th quarter 2004. (no tonnage reported) Rancho Palos Verdes – 4,820.50 tons collected through this expanded program in 2004. Redondo Beach - 1359.2 tons collected in 2004. Rosemead - Franchise hauler recycled 5,610.7 tons in 2004. Sierra Madre - Franchise hauler recycled 135.51 tons in 2004. South Gate - Commercial program collected 5,850 tons in 2004. Torrance - Program on-going. Artesia – Program diversion totaled 380 tons as reported from completed City job site recycling and waste reduction plan forms completed by contractors.

Beverly Hills - C&D Recycling Ordinance. Tonnage not available in 2004.

Duarte – C&D Ordinance was adopted and implemented for major developments in City in June 2004. Program diversion totaled 1543.71 tons in 2004

Hidden Hills - Program diversion totaled 727.07 tons in 2004.

Los Angeles – C&D Recycling Program; Inerts recycled by City Departments included 117,723 tons recycled by Street Services tons in 2004; 7,479 tons by the Department of Water and Power; 7,619.76 tons of material diverted by General Services, (including 1,432.60 tons of scrap metal, 6,184 tons of concrete, and 632 gallons of paint) asphalt and concrete demolition debris recycled by the Port of Los Angeles by crushing and stockpiling the crushed material for use on other Port projects. 29515.9 tons, LA World Airports: 10,574 tons and Recreation and Parks 52,340 tons. Total: 225,251.7 tons.

Lynwood – The city amended its C&D ordinance in March 2004. The amendment requires contractors to utilize the franchise hauler for non separated C&D disposal. The hauler collected 562.40 tons. The city requires contractors who self haul to complete waste reduction and recycling forms in the permit process.

Manhattan Beach – C&D Recycling Ordinance adopted February 20, 2004 which applies to all City projects

Pomona - Program on-going.

Rancho Palos Verdes – Residents and contractors continue to be encouraged to recycle inert material at local facility. 26,743 tons delivered in year (16,127 recycled). Other C&D taken to C&D MRF in nearby city.

Redondo Beach – Program expanded in 2004. Tonnages were not tracked due to poor participation of contractors. 2005 Tonnages are being tracked.

Rosemead – Additional changes were made to the 2004 policy in 2005 in an effort to provide policy that contractors could use.

Sierra Madre – C&D Recycling Ordinance adopted July 6, 2004; recycled 524.94 tons inerts in 2004.

South Gate – C&D Recycling Ordinance adopted May 25, 2004; in 2004 recycling from land clearing operations totaled 1,789 tons.

Torrance – C&D Recycling totaled 8,948 tons in 2004. Tonnage noted is from City trucks taken to Chandlers and 639 tons of salvage from Puente Hills. C&D Recycling Ordinance adopted February 1, 2005.

Additions to Program Notes: 2004 AR: All 14 members have ongoing education for the public and actively promote waste reduction programs through electronic media outlets, such as radio/TV advertisements and public service announcements, telephone information hotlines, web pages announcements, promotional videos, and slide presentations. Programs continuing.

> Duarte promotes resident participation in LA County wide HHW and E-waste events through flyers, website calendar and city referrals through inquiry phone calls.

Hidden Hills promotes reduce, reuse, and recycle concepts in its electronic notification to residents. The City is in the process of developing a webpage dedicated to recycling, stormwater and other environmental issues faced by our community.

Rosemead, in addition to providing LA County and CIWMB literature to residents and locating businesses, offers a recycling guide in both Chinese and English, available at City Hall. A Spanish version will be available during the 1Q 2006.

Sierra Madre is continuing to advertise all of its programs on the City's website and closed-circuit television channel. Listed at the bottom of every single advertisement is the City Public Works phone number or the number of Los Angeles County Public Works, depending on the program. It is not certain how much diversion can be attributed to these programs; however because of the number of calls received, these two forms of advertisement are considered successful in notifying residents concerning programs and how to reduce or recycle certain types of waste.

South Gate provides HHW/UO information on city's cable station. Due to budget constraints, there are limited recycling resources available on the City's website. The City will rely on regional agency's website development for outreach.

> Hidden Hills City staff participated in a community event in 2004, disseminating outreach materials as well as answering questions from residents. Approximately 200 promotional items were distributed during the event.

> Rancho Palos Verdes continued to promote SR and recycling in 2004 through a variety of media. New recycling guides were produced, articles and ads appeared in local papers and the waste hauler sent brochures on recycling to 10,000 homes.

> Sierra Madre began a co-op public outreach program in February of 2004. This program resulted in the Cities of Arcadia, Monrovia and Sierra Madre leveraging their used oil block grant and Dept. of Conservation block grant funds to place used oil or recycling ads every week in the tri-city newspaper. The program is continuing in FY 05-06 and is believed to be very successful in notifying residents in the three cities as to which used oil collection centers and recycling centers are available to them. The City also sends out billing inserts every month notifying residents of the numerous programs available to them. Lastly, the City is working with its regional agency (Los Angeles Regional Agency - LARA) to begin designing and marketing a multiple city recycling guide.

South Gate bill inserts are used to inform commercial customers of recycling opportunities, brochures for new customers are distributed and additional program information is available upon request.

Torrance program is ongoing and added several new brochures for businesses and multifamily information and for the new C/D program.

Duarte nominated several businesses/organizations for recognition from LARA Board for innovative recycling programs. Three awards for the City of Duarte were given; Santa Teresita Hospital, Burrtec Waste Industries and Able Card Corporation.

Manhattan Beach greatly enhanced commercial outreach through city and hauler staff efforts

Rancho Palos Verdes continues its "Recycler of Month" awards and beautification grants continue to be offered. Also, the hauler is providing outreach to commercial, multi-family, and schools.

Redondo Beach City staff conducts business outreach and working with Chamber of Commerce "Leadership Redondo" organization to promote commercial recycling to 1,000 businesses in 2004.

In Rosemead, a Spanish language edition of the recycling guide was budgeted for 2004.

Sierra Madre – The City hosted an environmental booth at the Wistaria festival in March of 2004. The booth featured information packets, flyers, and giveaways designed to educate residents on waste reduction, used oil recycling, energy/water conservation, and stormwater prevention. The City also hosted a "Smart Gardening Workshop" in May of 2004, which featured an expert on traditional composting, worm composting, water-wise gardening, fire-wise gardening, and drought tolerant planting. The session was well attended with several of the attendees coming from outside the City, indicating to the Public Works Department that the event was well advertised. A "Family Day in the Park" event was held in October 2004 and flyers and information were distributed to interested attendees.

South Gate – TA provided by hauler. Program information handed out at community events. City participates in regional WRAP awards ceremony. Held used oil collection event to distribute buckets and mats.

South Gate worked with elementary schools on Dept of Conservation sponsored South Gate Beverage Container Recycling Art Contest from November 2003 through February

2004 Public Works Department.

Duarte found that recycling curricula was not being included in classrooms and that School District cooperation was lacking. The city hopes to encourage the Schools to incorporate recycling curricula in the future.

Hidden Hills school continues to participate in the Environmental Defenders program.

Rosemead's two school districts continue to promote recycling and waste reduction. Rosemead High School Foreign Language Department teacher's recycling program helped to send students to Europe with the money raised from recycling materials.

Sierra Madre has worked with 5 schools within its boundaries to host an assembly designed to educate students on the 3Rs (reduce, reuse and recycle), HHW and Ewaste, used oil recycling and stormwater pollution prevention. The assembly is sponsored by LA County Public Works and features the vignette "Rock and Planet Tour." Following the assembly students and teachers are provided an information sheet with facts and statistics on recycling and how to participate in their school's new recycling program. Teachers are also provided a curriculum packet in the following weeks to provide students with interactive lessons on the environment.

Torrance's program is ongoing. City staff did not conduct presentations in 2004, however, the Living Wise program was provided again for 6th grades, and the high school shop classes were again provided with used oil recycling information and materials.
