2009 AR: Continuing with support of County outreach effort City has conducted a composting workshop. The City grass cycles at all public spaces such as parks, public spaces, etc. City's contracted landscapers are required to mulch, grass cycle, and compost. Compost is put back to use in areas that the City maintains. For example, mulch is used along the entire bike path trail to reduce weeds and retain moisture. City is also encouraging LARA to help subsidize backyard-composting containers for the residents.

Hidden Hills:

2009 AR: Ongoing. The City continues to promote and advertise the Los Angeles County Smart Gardening Workshops in an effort to increase participation.

Waste Management, hauler, taught a special composting class for the City's Mid Management Team in April 2009 - 30+ in attendance. Discount soil saver and worm bins are available for resident and city employee purchase. Flyers, banners over major intersections, newspaper ads, summer newsletter "One Person's Trash," website ads and information and city newsletter ads are all utilized to promote composting. Waste Management taught composting classes at MB schools. MB Botanical Garden advertised in April 2009 free classes for native gardening, composting in a garden, and water saving tips. WM taught 35 parent volunteers from Grades of Green how to teach composting classes to students.

2009 AR: Ongoing. The City continues to promote and advertise the Los Angeles County Smart Gardening Workshops in an effort to increase participation.

Pomona:

2009 AR: SRRE 3-11; Assistance with on-site composting and mulching activities to residents. The City participates in the countywide backyard and onsite-composting program. The City distributes flyers to promote workshops that are held in the area. The City also informs residents of the benefits of composting through both its solid waste recycling program and the storm water management program, for which onsite composting is called a "best management practice." Some residents practice backyard composting. The City of Pomona Parks Division contracts with West Coast Arborists to chip and or grind tree limbs and shrubs that they trim and place the mulch into the large parkway areas at the Phillips Ranch district.

2009 AR: Workshop was held April 25. City raffled 1 backyard composting bin and 1 worm-composting bin. The event had 25 participants in and rebated 9 bins to residents. City also encourages participation at County workshops in neighboring jurisdiction via website and emails. City continues to offer \$70.00 rebates on the purchase of new composting bins for RPV residents throughout the year (limit 1 per household). No tonnage total available for year.

The City installed 18 new trash and 18 new recycling containers in the North End Business District as part of a beautification project. 3 Big Belly Solar trash compactors and 1 recycling unit were installed in 2009 (2 in Polliwog Park, 1 on the corner of MBB/Morningside). 10 additional recycling containers were added to parks in MB; custom recycling inserts were made so that the City could "reuse" the current can design - basically the lid was modified to become a recycling container. Waste Management began recycling Styrofoam in the residential sector in 2009.
